



NJ embodies Dr. King's "Two Americas."


In white NJ the median household wealth is \$322,500.

In Black NJ it is just \$17,700—by design.

Think about that—a \$300,000+ racial wealth gap.



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ENSLAVED AFRICANS ONCE SOLD HERE

African slavery in New Jersey began with early European settlement. By 1766. circa 800 captive people had been sold here at the CoopersStreet Ferry and two other nearby ferry landings. In Africa, approximately 24 million captured men, women, and children marched to coastal prisons. Only half survived the journey. These 12 million survivors then endured deplorable conditions on the Middle Passage ocean crossings, where an additional 2 million died from disease, malnutrition, dehydration, drowning, suicide and abuse. By 1800, New Jersey's enslaved African population exceeded 12,000. New Jersey was the last Northern state to emancipate, adopting gradual abolition in 1804 and finally ratifying the 13th Amendment on January 23, 1866.

TWENIY DOLLARS REWARD.

R ANAWAY from the fubfcriber, on the night of the 26th July, 1799, a negro man named WILL, aged 49 years, about 5 feet 8 inches high; he is ftout made and has a bald head; when he walks he throws out his feet and toes in a fingular manner, walking very wide. He is a bold, daring fellow; talks and laugh's much, and very loud; he fpeaks Low Dutch and middling good Englith, although he frequently gives his words the Dutch accent; he is not fo very black as many of the African race; he is an arch fellow, and is very a five on a farm, or on the water.

Any perfon who will take up faid negro, and deliwer him to his mafter, or fecure him in any goal fo that his mafter may get him again, shall receive the above reward and all reasonable charges paid.

All mafters of veffels and other perfons are forbid taking away faid flave, or harboring him at their peril, under the penalty of one hundred pounds.

From its founding as a colony, New Jersey created a racially exclusive system for distributing property which has led to the stark racial wealth gap we see today.



 New Jersey provided each English white settling family with 150 acres of land and additional 150 acres for each enslaved Black person who worked on that land.



- By the 1800s, more than two-thirds of all enslaved Black people in the North were held captive here in New Jersey.
- And after becoming the last Northern state to end formal slavery, New Jersey developed its own form of sharecropping.

There is a direct line from the enslavement

- of Black people in New Jersey to:
- sharecropping;
- restrictive covenants;



- denial of homeownership opportunities through the GI Bill for Black WWII veterans;
- Jim Crow segregation;
- Redlining;
- Exclusionary zoning policies;
- Predatory lending practices;
- Today's racial wealth gap.

- Homeownership is the key driver of wealth.
- But just 38% of Black households in NJ own homes compared to 75.9% of white households.
- Black New Jerseyans' total wealth through homeownership is just 5.9% of NJ's \$860 billion in wealth through homeownership.

New Jersey has some of the worst racial disparities in the nation when it comes to wealth, health, youth and adult incarceration and school segregation.


This can be tied directly to our shameful history as the "slave state of the North" – and the generations of policy-driven structural racism that followed.
